If you absolutely have to have flowers and sensitive plants put them in Pots that you can move around when the weather is to severe to support them. You will have fewer headaches and failures.

- 6 Texas Sage 4 Yuccas 5 Desert Spoon cacti 4 Palo Verde trees 1 Mesquite 10 Oleanders
- 8 Bougainvilleas 2 Mexican Birds of Paradise 6 Lantanas 2 Muhlenberg Grass plants
- 6 Fountain Grass plants2 Texas cactus plants1 Lavender plant1 Natal plum

Jack says: "This keeps me busy trimming in the growing season however I do get a reprieve from November through March. Most of the plants will have new growth in late April."

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
